

A 'twit' is a silly or foolish person.




The monkey character in The Twits is from the African jungle. Learn more about Africa here!



Holes tells the story of Stanley Yelnats who has a history of bad luck, so when a miscarriage of justice sends him to Camp Green Lake Juvenile Detention Centre (which isn't green and doesn't have a lake) he is not surprised. There, Stanley meets other boys and together, they embark on a journey of mystery and friendship.




The tents at Camp Green Lake where the boys sleep.

Vocab Check:

Curse—a curse is a type of wish or words spoken which threatens the other person to have bad luck. Some believe in them and some don't. In fairy tales, a prince may be cursed to become a beast or a frog (i.e. frog prince) by a witch.



Camp Green Lake in Texas, USA, where the children are sent to dig holes all day!





Wonder tells the story of August (Auggie) who has a rare disease called Treacher Collins syndrome. To learn more about this disease, scan the code.



Wonder explores the theme of COMPASSION. One of our school values.
